## **Priest's Tidings**

To be poor and humble and gentle, merciful and weeping and persecuted – as things that would make us happy sounds quite strange to us. Is it not rather to have things aplenty and power and a lot of fun? To understand these statements we have to look at Jesus himself. For example, he led the life of the poor but he was happy. He suffered, but he made us happy and was at peace with God and himself. Let us ask our Lord that we may understand his teaching better and become more like him.

Today's message of the beatitudes is perhaps the most upsetting and challenging page of the Good News of Jesus Christ; it is right at the heart of the Gospel. The rich, the proud and the mighty are self-satisfied: they have what they want. They are dangerously shut in within themselves and with what they have. The poor and the suffering are not praised because they have nothing or are persecuted, but because the poor and the humble, the gentle and those who weep are aware that they have nothing but themselves to give, and so they are people who hope, expecting everything from God and from people. Let us be among these happy ones.

## **Prayer and Meditation**

### **Lectio:**

Mark's Gospel was likely written first, and Matthew and Luke used it as a source, along with other materials, especially for Jesus' teachings. In Matthew, Jesus' teachings are organised into five major sections, with the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:1-7:27) being the first. The Beatitudes open this sermon, highlighting what it means to live under God's kingdom. Jesus emphasises attitudes—such as humility, mercy, purity, peacemaking, obedience, and dependence on God—rather than worldly values like wealth or power. Those who cultivate these attitudes are aligned with God's priorities, bringing His kingdom to earth. The word often translated as "happy" could also mean "congratulations," indicating God's approval of these dispositions.

### **Meditatio:**

- Each of the beatitudes is challenging. Which do you find most challenging and why?
- Which of the beatitudes seems most achievable to you and why?
- What difference would it make to our world if all Christians demonstrated these attitudes in their lives?

### **Oratio:**

Choose just one of these beatitudes and talk to Jesus about it. Ask him for the grace to be able to give God's ways more priority in your life. Remember God sends the Holy Spirit to help us live for him. Last week we read how the apostles had to leave their everyday lives behind so they could learn how to live and minister in God's kingdom. Jesus has given us the beatitudes to enable us to do the same. Draw apart from your busy life for a little while every day this week and allow God to replenish you so that you can live out the beatitudes more faithfully.
